YCS 2019-20 Learning Improvement Plan

ON STRATEGY report accompanies this Principal's Report. See attached.

- 1) Just finishing up collection of Kindergarten EYE-TA which is a "readiness for learning" assessment. From the fall, we have just six students who were not yet showing the learning behaviours we are looking for.
- 2) The Math Screeners were recently completed with all Grades 2-8. These were recently discussed at a staff meeting, where staff meembers reviewed results with intentions of planning interventions for this final two months. We are slated to be above divisional goals, but there is still a sense we can achieve a little more in the final months.
- 3) F&P Literacy Achievement Data began on May 24 with Grade 4/5. We will collect for all grade levels in the next 3-4 weeks. We know we are above divisional and provincial targets, but we will still be looking at some students that we can pull together some time and resources to get them over the hump.
- 4) Our School Climate committee recently put together what looks to be a positive awareness week around Mental Health. This will be carried out on May 6-10.

Bulletin Items

Similar to YCS staff meetings, I am going to include a "bulletin" area that can be read over by parents through the meeting. When the other items of Principal's Report are completed, I will pause for questions related to Bulletin Items.

YCS Planning 2019-20

While discussions have occurred, this process is not yet complete. Budget implications and the division's desire not to remove teachers with permanent contracts are factors. There have been some recent retirement notices.

As a result, we remain without a "known" Kindergarten teacher, and hence our Kindergarten Orientation session scheduled for May 10 has been postponed. Obviously, we need to know the identity of the K teacher to go with this event. We are likely to fall back on a date closer to the last week of May 3. There are ideas about the arrangement of YCS classrooms as well, but much of this and class lists are likely to transpire in the next couple of weeks. It will be done quickly.

Mr. Beatty is already working on some Mental Health pieces and staff development (math) for 2019-20.

School Head Lice Practice

Mr. Beatty requires some feedback here. He recently met with Jackie Ellis of Public Health regarding some of the school's practices. She shared a "Help Control Head Lice" memo, which is one that Mr. Beatty is familiar. We actually send it home with families if we are dealing with a case.

Upon a head live case, YCS has always used a "practice" of NO NITS. This includes the family addressing presence of both louse & nits. Upon cleaning, Mr. Beatty checks the student and the student returns to school. There are other schools that welcome back students after a lice treatment. This was adopted at one time by SCC and it has remained in practice.

Mr. Beatty had a reasonable conversation with Mrs. Ellis in regards to the NO NITS policy. Mr. Beatty shared that students are not simply cast away. He has been involved in assisting with checking & cleaning. It is very rare that a student missing more than part of a day or a full day. In one case, the cleaning process was longer. Not in Yorkton, but Mr. Beatty was even involved in getting new mattresses donated to a home that was infested. Mr. Beatty shared he is very hands-on in supporting families. Mrs. Ellis was pleased with this.

There was some concern regarding the practice of NO NITS. Mr. Beatty is inquiring if the SCC would like to go in another direction. Continue with same? We could perhaps have Mrs. Ellis join our committee for an evening. DECISION

Calder Transition to Yorkdale Central

Calder students have now joined us on two occasions, and the school is coming to our own drama production in May. Mr. Beatty would really like to move our "Meet Your Next Year's Teacher" event earlier to accommodate Calder in this event. Our traditional second last day and the end of the school day just would not work for Calder students. The Calder principal shared possibly not doing some events, and students can come in a week before school in fall. Mr. Beatty will be pursuing the "Meet Your Next Year Teacher" event but earlier. Help Control Head Lice

What Are Head Lice?

Head lice are small insects that live on the scalp. **Anyone can get head lice.** They are common in classrooms and day care centres because children play closely together.

Head lice are not dangerous and they do not spread disease, but they are contagious and can be a very pesky problem. Having dirty hair does not cause head lice. Head lice cannot fly or jump and you cannot get them from your pets.

While they may be *found anywhere on the head*, they prefer to live on the scalp along the neckline and behind the ears. When lice bite the scalp, they cause itching.

How Can I Tell If My Child Has Head Lice?

Children may say they have a tickling feeling on their head or may be very itchy on their scalp.

The only way to be sure a person has an active case of lice is to find live lice. Children can have a few nits (lice eggs) without actually having an active case of head lice. Usually children have no more than 10 to 20 live lice.

Lice are not easy to see and can be hard to find. They are about the size of a sesame seed. They are usually greyish white or brown.



Nits are small, oval and blend into the color of the hair. Each nit is firmly attached to a hair. They cannot be washed out or flicked off like dandruff. Finding nits does not mean the individual has a current infestation and they should not be treated based on finding nits.

How Do I Check for Lice?

- 1. Apply ample hair conditioner to dry hair, enough to soak from the scalp to the end of the strands.
- 2. Remove tangles with a regular comb.
- 3. Start behind the ears and comb the hair section by section. Separating the hair with hair clips is helpful.
- 4. Place the lice comb against the scalp and pull to the end of the hair.
- 5. Check the comb for lice after each pull.
- 6. Wipe the comb with a tissue each time and look for lice.
- 7. Place the tissue in a bag.
- 8. Check all the hair over the entire head.
- 9. Repeat combing for every part of the head at least 5 times.
- 10. Once finished, tie the bag with the soiled tissues and throw it in the garbage.
- 11. If lice are detected and treatment is required, make sure that all conditioner is washed from the hair prior to treatment.

What is the Treatment for Head Lice?

Overtreatment and misdiagnosis are common.

Individuals with live lice in their hair should be treated. Do not treat anyone with a head lice product unless you find live lice. The presence of nits indicates a past infestation that may not be active.

Check everyone in the home for head lice.

There are a number of very effective treatments for head lice. Most contain an insecticide that kills the lice. They are pyrethrin (found in R&CTM shampoo/ conditioner) and permethrin (Nix[®] or Kwellada-P[®]).

Non-insecticidal treatments include:

- isopropyl myristate/ cyclomethicone (Resultz[™]) has been approved for use in Canada for individuals 4 years of age and older. It works by breaking down the waxy exoskeleton ('skin') of lice. The lice get dehydrated and die.
- Dimeicone solution (NYDA) affects the insect's breathing apparatus and suffocates the insect. It is not recommended for children < 2 years of age.

All of the above products require a second application 7 to 10 days after the first treatment.





Tell the pharmacist if anyone needing treatment is pregnant, breastfeeding, under four years of age, has allergies or a serious health problem.

A pharmacist, doctor or public health nurse can help you choose the best product for you.

If live <u>lice</u> (not nits) are found in the hair 24 to 48 hours after a treatment with one product:

- Treat right away with a different treatment product;
- Repeat this treatment 7 10 days later.

Examine <u>all</u> of the household members for head lice every day for 3 weeks after the first treatment.

Do Other Treatments Work?

Many home recipes and products sold in stores are based on mixtures of essential oils (eucalyptus, lavender, tea tree, etc.), salts or other natural substances. Some people have used oils like mayonnaise, olive oil and Vaseline or hair gels to try to smother lice. There is no proof that any of these work.

How Can I Help the Treatment Be More Effective?

Each product is different and has detailed directions for use. For example one product might say it should be put on dry hair while another should be put on wet hair. Each will say how long it should be left on the hair before rinsing out.

It is very important to read and follow the package directions carefully.

Home treatments, such as vinegar rinses, should not be used as they may make the treatment less effective.

Avoid unnecessary contact with the product since it can be absorbed through the skin.

Children with head lice should be treated and can attend school or child care as usual.

'No-nit' policies that keep children with head lice away from school are not necessary because:

- The presence of nits indicates a past infestation that may not be currently active;
- Head lice are common among young children;
- Head lice do not spread disease;
- Cases of head lice are often misdiagnosed;
- Children can have head lice for several weeks with no symptoms.

How Can You Prevent the Spread of Head Lice?

- Teach your children how head lice are spread by direct contact with the head of someone with an infestation and to avoid this kind of activity.
- It is a good idea to teach your children not to share brushes, combs or head gear such as hats, bandanas, etc.
- Check your child's head for live lice once a week all year long and daily during an outbreak.
- Head to head contact may be less if long hair is braided or tied back.

What Cleaning Needs to Be Done?

Lice cannot live for more than 2-3 days away from the scalp so excessive cleaning is not necessary.

Choose the best method to clean the following items (washing in hot water for 15 minutes or running through a drier on the hottest setting):

- All personal hair care items such as combs, barrettes, etc. Repeat this daily until the lice are gone.
- Items that have been in prolonged or intimate contact with the child's head (bedding, hats, etc.) at the time of first treatment.

For items that cannot be washed they should be placed in a sealed plastic bag for two weeks or for 48 hours at -10° C.

There is no need to vacuum or wash floors, carpets or furniture.

Do not use household sprays or lice sprays. They do not work and may be harmful to people.

Thanks for your time yesterday morning. I've put together a rough timeline below.

We will need to confirm how deep the sand after the playground is removed and the site is leveled. It can make it difficult to dig holes for the playground if it is all sand as it will continually fall in on itself. We would have to use an excavator and sonotube. I'll be in your are for other jobs this summer so I'll check in on the site after the playground is removed and we can form a plan on whether we can drill or have to excavate from there.

Existing structure to be removed prior to August 15th to allow time for the below. As I mentioned, if it was me, I would have that playground removed ASAP as it is a liability.

August 23rd or earlier -

Border of playground site to be 42' from the side walk next to the school, running parallel with the side walk.

Site leveled to approx 1% slope/

Drainage on site to be completed. installed 3' from perimeter of playground

2-3" drain rock to be spread throughout.



- Layout, drilling and leveling of holes.
- Bob cat to be provided with Auger attachment, 12 and 18" drill bit
- 2 volunteers to assist us
- Have 6x6 border and re-bar delivered to site

The evening of the 24th - The playground will arrive. If we have forks for the bobcat we can unload it. Then we can either leave it on site or have a group of volunteers move it into the school for the night. If you want to leave it on site you could have a volunteer watch it over night if you are concerned about it being stolen or tampered with. This typically depends on the area.
